## **NOVEMBER 21 MEETING:** Late 19th Century Immigration to America

The focus of Professor Van Gosse's talk was Nativism, which the speaker defined as hostility towards, or fear or dislike of, immigrants. He told a personal story of how his own father's name was changed, dropping the last name of Mahoney, due to problems the Irish faced. The US considered white Protestants the "right" kind of people, and the Catholics arriving from Europe as the "wrong" kind. Catholics were considered disloyal, tools

of Rome.

He highlighted the Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882 and the huge influx of immigrants from Southern and Eastern Europe that began around 1880. Most of these were seeking work, except the Russian Jews, who were escaping pogroms.

1908 saw the beginning of immigration record-keeping. Perusing those records, he said, showed that 52.5% of those immigrants came, worked, and then returned to their countries.

He also discussed the Italian immigrants who were seen as anarchists.

As WWI began, he said the flow of immigrants nearly stopped, which, in turn, fueled the "great migration" of blacks from the South to jobs in the North. In 1918, illegal immigration was finally defined and passports began to be required

(prior to that, you just "arrived" and "got off the boat").

A discussion of the KKK outside of the South was interesting. He said there were about 5 million, located all over the mid-West, PA, NJ, and even New York City. Their slogan was "100% Americanism - only white." He told a story of the Klan riot of 1927 in New York, young Klan men fighting Irish Catholic police. He said one of those arrested on the Klan side was Fred Trump, father of Donald.

WWII found American consuls worldwide complaining about the huge number of Jews trying to obtain visas, and a "quota" system began (see the handout).

In 1964-65, President Lyndon Johnson began to ease up the quotas and finally began a challenge to the idea of Nativism. [the handout is attached to this email]
