**Family History**: Are you interested in publishing a family history? A few of our members (notably George McMurtry) havre already done that and might be a good contact. In the May 27 Eastman Online Genealogy Newsletter, he suggests <u>LuLu</u>, a short-run self publisher who might be something to try. Apparently, they offer e-book and hard copy publishing, and seemingly, have no upfront costs until you have orders. The publish on-demand, which means you don't need to lay out a large up-front fee.
