Meet your program committee George Nettleton

George has been the coordinator for our club programs for over ten years, constantly keeping up with all the myriad of changes in - well Everything! Since "Genealogy Never Ends, " George provides ongoing educational programs to help us continue our genealogy research. Born in Danville, NY, these towns have been home: Mt. Morris, Harrison, and Pleasantville, Long Island, New York. His alma mater is SUNY, New Paltz.

George and Ruth have been married 60 years, and have a daughter in Illinois and son in Texas, each with a spouse and three children. In 1996, he retired from his last job on Long Island, after a career as a librarian. When George and his wife Ruth moved into Spring Run in 2004, the first club that he joined was our Genealogy Club, and he has spent 20 years bringing genealogy con-

tinuing education to us.

An interest in genealogy was sparked when, as a pre-teen, he found a Civil War uniform, complete (minus moth holes) with hat, swords, belt & buckle in his grandmother's Massachusetts home, and he actually worn that to events.

In college, a distant relative gifted him a Family Bible, and after his grandmother's death in 1968, he Inherited her 1939-44 diary. The diary's a treasure, as both his grandfathers died, and George and his two Nettleton cousins were born during that 1939-1944 span. A Mayflower connection was found by his Grandmother Amy Nettleton and Uncle Albert Nettleton who through twists & turns, connected his family to William Brewster. However, George has never applied to join the descendants of the Mayflower Society. Also notably, his G-Grandfather Asahel was one of the 1st settlers in The Union County (Greeley) Colorado

As a reference librarian, Geroge browsed many reference shelves to become familiar with collections. Books with Nettleton in them were copied (with the book's title page) and filed for "someday."

Someday came with retirement, when he and Ruth traveled to Connecticut, Massachusetts, Colorado & Illinois where his family lived. In 2000, They moved to Lee's Summit, MO, where Ruth's mother was in the largest CCRC at the time, John Knox Village. It "just happened" to be a short distance from the Mid-Continent Library, one of the top genealogy libraries in the country, AND maybe the only one with "open stacks" (full access to their whole collection!). George says that he has enjoyed this journey and is still trying to find "Adam."

And finally, the <u>Numerical Identification Files (NUMIDENT)</u> files from the Social Security Administration have three types of files: 25 million life or death claims; about 50 million death files; and 72 million SS-5 Application files. All span 1936-2007.
